To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas Noyes Palmer Swan, of La Porte County, Indiana,
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at La Porte,
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said Noyes Palmer Swan
according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 2d of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the
North half of the North West quarter of Section four, in Township thirty-four, North of Range five, West of the second
Meridian, in the District of Lands, subject to sale at La Porte, Indiana, containing eighty-five acres, and twenty-eight
hundredths of an acre,
according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
chased by the said Noyes Palmer Swan.

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the
several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said Noyes Palmer
Swan

and to his heirs, the said tract above described.

To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, therunto belonging, unto the said
Noyes Palmer Swan

and to his heirs and assigns forever.
