To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas John Brown, Assignee, of William Clark,
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at La Porte,
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said William Clark,
according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 25th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the
South half of the North East quarter of section two, in Township Thirtysix, North of Range Six West, in the
District of Land, subject to sale at La Porte, Indiana, containing eighty acres,
according to the official plat of the survey of the said Land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
chased by the said William Clark.

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the
several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said John
Brown,

and to his heirs, the said tract above described:
To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said
John Brown,

and to his heirs and assigns forever.
