To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas John McCormick of LaPorte County, Indiana has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at LaPorte, whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said John McCormick according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the South East quarter of section twelve, in Township thirty six North, of range six West, in the District of Lands subject to sale at LaPorte Indiana containing one hundred and forty three Acres, and seventy two hundredths of an acre, according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said John McCormick.

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**, in consideration of the premises and in conformity with the several acts of Congress in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said John McCormick and to his heirs, the said tract above described. To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said John McCormick and to his heirs and assigns forever.
