Fear that national preparedness on the part of the United States, under stress of war conditions in Europe might result in the militarization of the CCC has been one of the most talked of subjects by enrollees of this organization. However, the question seems to be at least temporarily settled by the recent statement given out by CCC Director Robert Fochner. Mr. Fochner stated that no plans are afoot to force military training upon the CCC. He pointed out that the CCC legislation does not provide for such use of the CCC enrollees and that in all respects the CCC is a civilian organization. In event of war by the United States, CCC enrollees would be upon the same footing as

any other civilian of their age and physical fitness.

Although many enrollees besides myself are in favor of military training it does not seem fair that enrollees not desiring such training should be forced to take it. If military training should be connected to the CCC organization it would soon only fair to set aside certain companies for those enrollees not in favor of such training. Thus enrollees volunteering for such service would set themselves whole-heartly into the job that they want to do. This would give greater cooperation and develop an asset for the United States as well as the enrollees concerned.


We plan to have a printed paper soon. Any one interested in learning to operate the

AREA OFFICE ESTABLISHED


FOREMEN'S CONFERENCES
